In partnership with the County Behavioral Health Department, the SCCOE has launched a naloxone campaign to help combat the rise of opioid-based overdoses. The SCCOE is working with school districts and private schools to draft naloxone policy, train staff and community members to recognize a possible overdose and to administer the potentially life-saving medication. Fentanyl also goes by the names: Apache, Jackpot, Dance Fever, Murder 8, Friend, Tango & Cash, or Goodfellas. Over 150 people die every day from overdoses related to synthetic opioids like fentanyl. Recognizing signs of opioid overdose can save a life.

Signs include:

- 6 P D O O F R Q V W U L F W H G † S L Q S R L Q W S X S L O V .
- Falling asleep or losing consciousness
- Slow, weak, or no breathing
- Choking or gurgling sounds
- Limp body
- Cold and/or clammy skin
- Discolored skin (especially in lips and nails)

It may be difficult to tell whether an individual is high or experiencing an overdose. If you

overdosing, follow these steps:

1. Immediately call 9-1-1
2. If available, administer naloxone
